Vimy Remembered


1917-2017

In memory of the 100th anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge, the Military Communications and Electronics Museum has created a wonderful exhibition as part of their ongoing remembrance of the soldiers of the Great War.

To highlight the contribution of the Royal Canadian Corps of Signals the Museum is featuring three of the original plaster models designed by Walter S. Allward, the process he used in the design and construction of the Vimy Memorial through the display “**Visions of Vimy**” and an interactive 3D digital map of the battle created in partnership with Nipissing University. The Museum also partnered with Queen’s University Archives, the City of Kingston and the Directorate of History and Heritage for this multi-faceted exhibit.

The Vimy Memorial was unveiled on July 26th, 1936 in France and serves as a monument for peace and not the celebration of war; it is a place to mourn and remember the human cost of war.

As part of our ongoing effort to honour the Great War, exhibits for Hill 70 and the Third Battle of Passchendaele will be opening in August 2017 and November 2017.
